SUNSHINE GUIDE TO THE BEAVER ISLAND ARCHIPELAGO, MICHIGAN

LOCATION: The Beaver Island Archipelago is located in northeastern Lake Michigan, roughly halfway between Michigan's upper and lower peninsulas. The island group is politically attached to Charlevoix County, but has always enjoyed a certain measure of autonomy. The major town (and terminus of the 35-mile ferry crossing from Charlevoix) is St. James, at the northern tip of Beaver Island proper. Elevations range from lake level (574') to some 236 feet above it. The island landscape is that of rolling sandy hills, and is largely wooded.

COMMENTS: Bright sunshine is likely on half of the daylight hours of the year. This might range from a low of 28% in November, to a high of 64% in July. The lowest temperature of the year should be close to -9 on some calm and clear winter sunrise, and the highest should be near 90 on some sunny and windless summer afternoon. Sensible temperatures (the ones you actually feel) will be a degree or two cooler than actual ones during the warmer weather, and pretty much the same as actual ones the rest of the time. The ground is usually frozen and snow-covered from late November through early April. Temperatures will drop below zero perhaps a dozen times during the winter months. Summers are short and warm more often than hot. The effects of Lake Michigan are such that all of the seasons are delayed about two weeks over what might be expected on either mainland.
